Concussion Management Reminders

Concussion awareness, education and proper management continues to be a priority for the KSHSAA and its member schools. In the Sports Medicine & Safety section of the KSHSAA website there are links to the National Federation of State High School Association's (NFHS) most recent recommendations on the management of concussions, as well as KSHSAA's concussion management guidelines and recommendations. These guidelines will not only assist member schools in the prevention, awareness and proper management of concussions, but will also assist schools in complying with Kansas Statute 72-135, the School Sports Head Injury Prevention Act, which became law July 1, 2011. There are also several links to current educational resources including the Kansas Sports Concussion Partnership website (www.kansasconcussion.org).

Please remember, the School Sports Head Injury Prevention Act REQUIRES a Parent/Student Concussion Information Release Form be signed each year by the student and a parent/guardian. If schools choose to use the sample provided on the KSHSAA website, the form will be updated for the 2020-2021 school year by April 1.

Don't forget, anyone can take the FREE online course at *www.nfhslearn.com*, "Concussion in Sports – What You Need to Know." This is an excellent course for coaches to view, to meet their annual preseason concussion education training requirement.

The KSHSAA will continually keep its member schools informed with the most up-to-date information on this very important issue.

KSHSAA Citizenship Awards

Two Citizenship Certificates are mailed to each high school and middle/junior high school principal in mid-April. These KSHSAA awards are to be presented during commencement or an awards assembly to two students (typically one graduating girl and one graduating boy) who have proved to be the most outstanding citizens of their school. The criteria to be used for the selection of the recipients are as follows:

Respect:

- 1. Shows respect at all times for the Flag, our National Anthem and the Constitution.
- Shows respect for the students and citizens of the school and community.
- 3. Respects both public and private property.
- 4. Shows respect for the student and adult leaders in school and community.
- Demonstrates a tolerance and respect for the beliefs and convictions of others.

Responsibility:

- 1. Demonstrates the willingness to assume citizenship responsibilities in school and community.
- 2. Works to build school pride through active participation in those projects which publicize, honor or beautify the school.
- 3. Displays good sportsmanship whether as a participant or spectator.
- 4. Is friendly toward new students and encourages them to become involved in school activities.

Reverence:

1. Shows reverence, concern and respect for the well-being of others

Game Contracts are Binding

Principals, athletic directors and coaches are reminded that game contracts between schools are binding and must be honored. Changes in school personnel or reorganization of leagues does not give any school the opportunity to unilaterally renege on a contract. All existing game contracts, including those signed by previous school administration, shall be honored unless both schools mutually agree to dissolve the contract. As a voluntary association of member schools, it is imperative this fundamental obligation be honored by all. To do otherwise undermines the very nature of our Association, and the activity programs offered to our students.

Host Families for Foreign Students Need to Know...

As school administrators and/or counselors talk with potential host families, the status of foreign students must be immediately established. A copy of KSHSAA's Form FES-J1 and/or FES-J2 should be available to the administrator and/or counselor AND the host family to answer interscholastic eligibility questions. Helping potential host families with their questions can help to avoid unpleasant situations due to a misunderstanding of KSHSAA Rule 18-1-12.

The following information may be helpful as you answer questions regarding foreign students and interscholastic activity participation:

1. A foreign student wanting to live with a community family who is not a part of a KSHSAA recognized program is not eligible to participate in interscholastic activities until the required 18 week period has elapsed. These students may be considered for non-varsity participation via the TE-P Form (see **Rule 18-1-12**).

- A foreign exchange student sponsored by a recognized agency and approved on a KSHSAA Form FES is eligible to participate immediately in interscholastic activities for only that academic school year.
- 3. A foreign exchange student is permitted only one 18 week transfer eligibility waiver in their initial year, provided the program is on the approved CSIET list. A student returning for a second exchange year of attendance is not eligible for 18 weeks (see **Rule 18-1-12**).
- 4. A foreign exchange student who has graduated is not eligible.

KSHSAA member schools recognize only those agencies on the approved list of the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET). They have complied with standards established for educational travel and exchange programs on behalf of schools, students, educational groups and the exchange community in the United States. This list is updated yearly and appears on page two of the KSHSAA Form FES.

AED Checklist

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is the number one cause of sudden death in student-athletes during activity. In the event of a sudden cardiac arrest episode an automated external defibrillator (AED) can save a life. <u>Each minute defibrillation is delayed</u>, the chance of survival decreases 10%. The following can serve as an AED checklist to be sure you are prepared.

Ш	The AED is easily accessible at every practice/game loca-
	tion and available for use within 2-3 minutes (ideally it
	is onsite). The device is NOT in a locked or secured area where retrieval could be a challenge.
	Personnel are always available onsite who are trained in CPR and AED use.

The AED is checked regularly to ensure it is working and
the pads and battery are not expired.

The Emergency Action Plan has been rehearsed PRIOR
to the beginning of the season with everyone potentially
involved in the emergency response.

Someone has been designated to retrieve the AED if needed
This person knows the exact location of the device at all
times.

Wireless Microphones and FCC Bandwidth Information for Schools

There will be an upcoming change in the FCC bandwidth that could affect school wireless microphone systems. By 2020, wireless microphones in the 600 MHz and 700 MHz bands will be reduced due to the sale of these frequencies to wireless service providers. Below you will find a link with the FCC information. It will also be posted on the KSHSAA website homepage under NEW TOPICS and can also be found on the NFHS performing arts pages for your reference.

Some microphone companies are offering rebates to upgrade microphone systems that will be affected.

During the 2020-2021 school year coaches will have the opportunity to fulfill their rules meeting attendance requirements either online or by attending one of the onsite officials rules meetings. A complete list of in-person rules meetings in all sports will be available on the KSHSAA website later this summer. The dates for the coaches online rules meetings will also be provided on our website this summer. Track and field coaches will continue to have only the online rules meeting option. The only other exception is gymnastics coaches who are required to attend the in-person rules meeting.

Spirit/Dance, Debate, and Speech and Drama sponsors will still have the option to attend an in-person rules meeting or an online meeting to fulfill their requirements.

Officials Rules Meetings Required

The KSHSAA is committed to providing quality educational and training opportunities for registered officials. In the most recent KSHSAA strategic plan, member schools indicated recruiting, training and retaining officials is a top priority. The KSHSAA continues to add opportunities through summer clinics and camps for officials to improve their skills. On an every-other-year basis, officials in specific sports are required to attend an in-person rules meeting to fulfill their rules meeting requirement. Coaches are also welcome to attend the in-person meetings and receive rules meeting credit.

Sports in which an in-person rules meeting is required for registered officials in 2020-2021: Baseball, Football, Gymnastics, Soccer.

There is no online option for officials in the above sports during the 2020-2021 school year. A complete schedule of the 2020-2021 officials rules meetings will be sent to all currently registered officials in May with their registration materials.

The following sports will offer an online meeting for officials to fulfill their rules meeting requirements in 2020-2021: **Basketball**, **Softball**, **Volleyball**, **Wrestling**.

Since some officials prefer the in-person meeting format every year, the KSHSAA will be offering a limited number of in-person rules meetings in basketball, softball, volleyball and wrestling at select locations across Kansas. Officials may choose to fulfill their rules meeting requirement in these sports at one of these in-person meetings OR by using the online option.

Track and field starters must fulfill their rules meeting requirement online every year.

2020 Summer Coaching Rule Advisory

Currently many school facilities are closed and not available for coaches to work with their athletes due to the coronavirus pandemic. As we move closer to the summer period when coaches may work with their potential athletes below are the current rules for contact periods for coaches and athletes. If there are changes to the current guidelines, those will be posted on the KSHSAA website and communicated to school administrators.

Dates for 2020

Beginning May 23 until July 19 all coaches may coach teams and conduct workouts/practices. Beginning May 24, coaches may have a "coaches one-week team camp." **Only students enrolled at the school may attend the "coaches one-week team camp."** No "coaches one-week team camps" may take place after July 18 in any sport.

Beginning July 20 and ending August 1 basketball coaches are restricted to working with no more than three students who initiate a request for individual help/coaching instruction from their coach. Basketball coaches may no longer coach their players in leagues/tournaments.

Beginning July 20 and ending August 1 football coaches are restricted to working with no more than five for 8-man football and six for 11-man football when those students initiate a request for individual help/coaching instruction from their coach. Football coaches may no longer coach their players in leagues/tournaments.

Beginning July 20 and ending August 1 volleyball coaches are restricted to working with no more than four students who initiate a request for individual help/coaching instruction from their coach. Volleyball coaches may no longer coach their players in leagues/tournaments.

A Summer Moratorium Week will be held from July 2-8. During this period, coaches may not engage with student-athletes in any practice, training, weight lifting, conditioning, competition or travel for all activities except fine arts or spirit. School facilities will be closed during this time for all school teams and school sports.

August 2-16 volleyball, basketball and football coaches may only participate with their athletes in weight lifting and nonsport specific conditioning. During this two week period, no other coaching or instruction is permitted by volleyball, football and basketball coaches.

Communicate and Avoid Burnout

Administrators, coaches, parents and student-athletes should all be involved in the discussion concerning expectations for the summer months. Contact during the summer is optional, but many students/parents feel if they don't participate they won't be given a chance during the school year. Remember, if kids get burned out during the summer trying to please two or three coaches, an employer, and then carve out time for family, they are quite likely not to be in your program when the season starts.

These regulations apply to all athletic activities sponsored by the KSHSAA.

Fundraising to Pay for Athletic Camps

If students wish to fundraise to pay for summer athletic camps, clinics or tournaments, they may not do so at school sponsored events. When soliciting money they must represent themselves as an individual(s), not as a school team. Any money collected for the purpose of paying for summer camps, clinics or tournament entries must not be deposited and run through a school account. Schools/booster clubs cannot be involved in funding these activities or distributing the money. Booster clubs are treated the same as member schools in this regard.

School Uniforms

School owned uniforms, practice gear, shoulder pads and other individual player equipment **cannot** be used for coaches' one-week summer camps, other camps, clinics, tournaments or gatherings of teams at schools to play games or scrimmages. Team equipment such as balls, blocking dummies and toss backs, etc., may be used provided use is approved by the school district.

Football Helmets & Shoulder Pads

Member school football coaches may not conduct a contact football camp. Shoulder pads may not be used during summer workouts/practices. With approval by the school district, football helmets may be used during the school coach's one-week team camp. The school district must approve the use of helmet/shoulder pads by players at college or other summer camps. (These camps may not be sponsored by the school employed coaches.)

School Facilities

School facilities may be used provided the school district has approved the use of the facility and the proper rental/lease agreements have been approved. Remember, these workouts, practices, camps and clinics are the "coaches' responsibility to administer"; they are not the school's responsibility.

Insurance Coverage

The KSHSAA catastrophic and liability insurance policy does not cover these summer activities. Each coach is responsible for securing insurance for their camps, clinics, workouts or practices. Coaches should visit with their school administration about whether the school's insurance policy extends to these activities as they are not "school programs" but rather coach programs.

Pick-up Games

May a coach invite other groups of kids from other schools to their facility to play "pick-up" games? Yes, but no school uniforms may be used, and facilities must be rented/leased per board policy.

Kenneth Edward (Ed) Trimmer served in the Kansas House of Representatives from 2006-2018 where he was the Minority Whip from 2015 until the end of his tenure, as well as the ranking minority member for several committees. His assignments included Education, Education Budget Committee, education interim committees and KPERS interim study commissions among many other committees. Prior to serving in the legislature, Trimmer served 32 years as an award winning teacher and coach at Winfield High School. His main subject material involved debate/speech and other English/Language Arts courses. He was inducted into the both the Kansas Debate Coaches Hall of Fame and the Kansas Teachers' Hall of Fame after his retirement. Trimmer is currently serving on the Winfield Board of Education and teaches English at Burden-Central High School.

When informed of this recognition, Trimmer said, "I am honored to be included in the list of such dedicated people who have received this award. I have dedicated my life to public education because I believe it is the great equalizer. Any motivated student or athlete, who has the desire and work ethic, can achieve great things no matter what their background or economic status."

2020 Oscar Stauffer Sportscaster of the Year

The 2020 KSHSAA Oscar Stauffer Sportscaster of the Year award winner is Glen Grunwald of KWBW Eagle Radio in Hutchinson.

A central Kansas native who attended Pawnee Rock High School near the town of Albert, Grunwald started his life in a different direction. Graduating from Fort Hays State University with



a BS in education in 1971 and a MS in school administration in 1977, he ended a 10 year career in education and began what would become a 30 year career in Pharmaceutical Sales. Grunwald spent 25 of those years with GlaxoSmithKline where he served as a Territory Representative before becoming a Therapeutic Specialist and eventually a District Manager.

His love for sports broadcasting began as a hobby in 1985 when college friend Dennis Franz asked him to help with some sports broadcasting for his station in Larned, Kansas. After working various high school broadcasts for various stations for a few years, Barton Community College came calling in 1990 and Grunwald moved to Junior College basketball and volleyball. Beginning in 1998, Grunwald joined Eagle Radio in Hutchinson to be the voice of the Hutchinson Blue Dragons for basketball and color commentator and sideline reporter for football. After his retirement in 2010 from Pharmaceutical Sales, Grunwald became more involved with Eagle Radio Hutchinson by assisting with Hutchinson High School athletics in addition to calling Hutchinson Community College football and basketball games. He was honored by the KAB in 2017 as the recipient of the Hod Humiston Award for Broadcast excellence.

In 2019 Grunwald was named Sports Director for Eagle Radio Hutchinson taking the place of long time Salthawk Sports voice Rusty Hilst. With this position came the responsibility of doing play-by-play for Hutchinson High School football, basketball and baseball games in addition to Hutchinson Community College football and men's basketball broadcasts. Grunwald still makes time to be active with Special Olympics Kansas where he was a member of the charter board of directors and has served two terms as the board chairman.

A 1996 graduate from Mulvane High School, Kasey McDowell participated in baseball, football and basketball before attending Kansas State University where he received a computer science



degree in 2003. At the request of the Mulvane High School coach, McDowell created a website for Mulvane baseball in 2004. He then went on to develop and run sites for the high school football, basketball and softball teams within the next four years. In 2013, McDowell combined all the websites and included all other high school sports to become the owner/operator of Kmac Web Design and mulvanesports.com. During this time, he also developed a way to publish articles to the website is now the primary writer of sports news coverage. McDowell does all this in his spare time as he works for the Mulvane School District in the Technology department as his primary job.

Mulvanesports.com is in its 7th year of operation and covers all high school and middle school sports from the varsity level on down. Each activity section features the rosters, schedules, stats, awards, photos, alumni sections that display the rosters/ team/results from years past (some back to early 1900s) and college trackers that covers all athletes that go on to compete at the collegiate level. McDowell also produces football highlight videos for each week that are in the football video gallery and has been doing so for over 10 years. The website features a "Virtual Wall of Fame" and "Virtual Wall of Honor" matching the physical wall of fame at Mulvane High School featuring athletes and teams that have won state titles, all state selections, and standout athletes throughout the history of Mulvane athletics. McDowell also developed a companion mobile app for apple and android products for mulvanesports.com which displays news articles, rosters, schedules, and pictures for the current season.

The Kansas State High School Activities Association, through its member schools, defines sportsmanship as those qualities of behavior which are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. A "rating" system is used allowing schools to compete against a "standard of excellence", rather than competing against one another.

RATIONALE: Prior to the game, the head coach will notify the referee of the designated representative (coach or player) who will make decisions regarding penalty acceptance or declination.

HALFTIME INTERMISSION OPTION FOLLOWING WEATHER DELAY:

{Table 3-1 NOTES 2 (NEW)}

RATIONALE: The halftime intermission may be shortened by mutual agreement of opposing coaches if a weather delay occurs during the last three minutes of the second period.

40-SECOND PLAY CLOCK CLARIFICATION:

{3-6-1a (1) e EXCEPTIONS 2 AND 3 (NEW)}

RATIONALE: To eliminate a potential timing advantage gained by the defensive team, the rules committee approved the play clock being set to 40 seconds when an officials' timeout is taken for an injury to a defensive player or a defensive players has an equipment issue.

25-SECOND PLAY CLOCK CLARIFICATION:

{3-6-1a (1) f (NEW)}

RATIONALE: Following a legal kick when either team is awarded a new series, the play clock will be set to 25 seconds.

DISCONSERTING ACT PENALTY RECLASSIFIED:

{7-1-9 (NEW), 7-1-9 PENALTY (NEW), 9-5-1d}

RATIONALE: Disconcerting acts or words by the defense has been reclassified from a 15-yard unsportsmanlike foul to a 5-yard foul.

SPIKING THE BALL TO CONSERVE TIME:

{7-5-2 EXCEPTION}

RATIONALE: The exception to allow a player to conserve time by intentionally throwing the ball forward to the ground immediately after receiving the snap, has been expanded to include any player positioned directly behind the center. This exception now included snaps that are not hand-to-hand.

Important Dates for Coaches to Know

Volleyball coaches should be aware of the following dates regarding contact with their players this summer:

May 23 - July 19, 2020: During this period of time, a volleyball coach may have contact with their athletes and may coach their athletes. If a coach chooses to conduct a one-week camp with their athletes, it must be done between May 23 - July 19 (see KSHSAA Handbook, Rule 30-1-6 and Rule 10).

July 20 - August 2, 2020: Coaches may supervise use of indoor/outdoor facilities (no sport specific instruction may be given); may work with individual students of a single group (no more than 4 students) provided instruction is on a voluntary basis and requested by the student; may coach against their players; may transport athletes to non-school

competitions in that sport; **may** transport their athletes to camps and clinics. (NOTE: **Coaches MAY NOT** use school transportation and may not be reimbursed for personal mileage.)

August 2-16, 2020: During this period of time, a volleyball **coach MAY NOT** have any contact with their players. Only voluntary weight training and conditioning is permitted for all athletes.

August 17, 2020: First day of practice for 2020 volleyball season for all KSHSAA high school and middle school programs.

Assistant Officials Important and Required

A volleyball match is administered by two referees (R1 and R2) and five assistant officials – a score keeper, a libero tracker, a timer and two line judges. SCHOOLS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR NOT ONLY SECURING THESE OFFICIALS BUT ALSO TRAINING THEM IN THEIR DUTIES. Information regarding the responsibilities and duties of these key individuals is located at www.kshsaa.org>Athletics>Volleyball>Announcements.

START NOW! It is never too early to begin identifying the assistant officials for your fall volleyball matches.

Volleyball Line Judge Flag Q & A

Line judges at all KSHSAA high school varsity matches will be required to use a red flag when carrying out their duties.

The flags are to be solid red in color and of a recommended size of approximately 12 inch by 12 inch to approximately 16 inch by 16 inch. The flag and hand grip should be securely affixed to the pole.

Flags are sold in sets (2 flags). A set is needed for each court being used for competition.

1. Q: Do most sporting goods companies have these flags available?

A: Some do, however they may not be available in their brick and mortar store. Online is the best way to secure a set.

2. Q: What about stores like Walmart, etc.?

A: Available online only.

3. Q: Where can I have access to the largest selection of these flags?

A: Amazon. Prices range from \$13 - \$45.

4. Q: Can we make our own flags?

A: YES. The size of this square red flag is anywhere from 12"x12" (smallest size) to 16"x16" (largest size). This square material will need to be securely attached to a dowel rod 18"-22" in length.

5. Q: Which is the best – a manufacturer's set of flags or a homemade set of flags?

A: Both will serve the intended purpose. Most manufactured flags will have a grip at the end of the stick which provides for comfort and control.

6. Q: Are the line judge flags to be use at all interscholastic volleyball contests?

A: The flags are required for KSHSAA high school varsity matches. Use at sub-varsity matches is not required but recommended.

7. Q: How many sets of flags will our school need to have?

A: Each court will need a set (2 flags). Each court being used for competition will need a set.

8. Q: What are the training opportunities for our line judges?

A: The KSHSAA will provide online information for the use of these flags. It is recommended that your line judges watch this presentation prior to working a match. In addition, it is suggested that potential line judges work a pre-match scrimmage.

9. Q: What do we do if the varsity line judges do not have a red flag?

A: Play the match without flags. Officials will notify the KSHSAA following the match.

10. Q: Do registered officials need to have a set of flags for the matches they officiate?

A: NO. It is the school's responsibility to provide the flags for the line judges unless other arrangements have been made.

Modifications Allowed at Sub-Varsity and Middle School Level

While high school varsity squads must adhere to the NFHS playing rules, modifications are allowed at the sub-varsity level. Sub-varsity level is junior varsity, sophomore, freshman and all middle school squads. Those modifications may include:

Game/Match Length - may be shortened if needed, due to time constraints, facilities, etc. **NOTE:** Be sure to notify opponents of any modification to match length – by mutual agreement.

Uniform - appropriate uniforms are required per NFHS Volleyball Rule 4-2, however variances in style and number placement are allowed.

Starting a match with fewer than 6 players - permitted at high school sub-level and middle school matches, **Rule** 6-4-5 must still be followed

Performance Evaluation

KMEA has requested the following statement be adhered to by **adjudicators** in evaluating regional and state music festival performances:

- 1. Rate the performance you hear <u>today</u> on its merits, **not on potential.**
- 2. **Justify your ratings** with comments, regardless of the rating assigned.
- 3. Take this time to **review the justification paragraph and the ratings sheet** given to you. Please refer to the information sent to you by the Kansas State High School Activities Association.

Music Memorization

Instrumental soloists are <u>not required</u> to memorize their music for regional or state music festivals.

Vocal soloists <u>will continue</u> the music memorization policy as published in the *KSHSAA Music Manual*.

SPEECH & DRAMA

Debate - National Qualifiers

IMPORTANT - Debate season ended January 18, 2020 for Kansas students. Only National Tournament Qualifiers (students who qualify via competition standards to an approved national tournament) may participate in an additional three (3) debate activities beginning SCW#30. No student shall exceed a total of five (5) tournaments after SCW#30, including those national tournaments they attend. The national tournaments must be approved by the National Association of Secondary Principals (NASSP) as required by the KSHSAA Bylaw, Article XIV. Students who did not qualify may NOT participate.

Cheerleaders, drill teams, dance teams and pompon squads are invited to attend any of the camps (designed for their particular type of spirit group), but an effort has been made to consider travel distances. Each camp provides quality facilities and the same length of time, number of hours of instruction and cost per delegate (\$300 per delegate). This fee includes accident/sickness insurance, three nights housing, nine meals, camp materials and quality UCA/UDA instructors.

We are offering a commuter camp option this year for schools who are in close proximity. The fee is \$230 per delegate/coach, which includes accident/sickness insurance, camp materials and quality UCA/UDA instructors.

Enrollment information: send card **SPR-3** (cheer) and/ or card **SPR-4** (dance/pompon/drill team) found online, to KSHSAA. A \$40 deposit <u>per person</u> is DUE to KSHSAA by May 1.

Spirit Coaches/Advisors

Schools are strongly urged to send qualified adults who are serving as coaches/advisors with their students to summer spirit group camps. School coaches/advisors are responsible for their own students. Summer camp fees are \$300 per delegate or coach/advisor. To help defray conference tuition, one adult will be assessed tuition costs by the following formula:

20 students or more— - no tuition charged 10-19 students— - 1/2 tuition charged

0-9 students - —full tuition charged

Schools with coaches/advisors in attendance will develop friendships, learn professional techniques and discuss common concerns through sponsor seminars. Active advisors will take home many ideas that can be developed throughout the school year.

Student Council Objectives

Before Student Council can have any degree of success, it must have definite purposes for existing, and its members, the student body and the faculty must be aware of these purposes.

While the objectives may vary from school to school, there are certain basic goals found in almost all constitutions. These basic objectives are:

General and Specific Purposes

General objectives are broad statements of purposes which are found in the student council's constitution. They are similar for all schools and do not change much from year to year. They are the main goals reached through choosing specific purposes and doing related projects.

General purposes might include:

- Developing character and other positive personal qualities among young people
- Teaching democratic procedures
- Fostering promotion and development of democracy as a way of life
- Providing for training and experience in the skills and techniques of good citizenship
- · Contributing to the total educational growth of students
- Providing for learning experiences for youth through the solution of meaningful problems

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- Helping each student reach maximum educational growth and development
- Developing positive attitudes regarding law, order and authority
- · Promoting good human relations in the school community
- · Promoting the general welfare of the school
- Providing a forum for student opinion and hearing the many other voices
- · Providing organized services for students and faculty

Specific purposes include goals which are centered in particular project areas usually related directly to current problems obstructing general goal attainment.

Specific purposes might include promotion of harmonious student-faculty-community relations, and:

- · Coordination of student activities
- · Development of school spirit, pride and morale
- · Keeping school buildings and grounds clean and neat
- · Maintaining good conduct in the halls and lunchroom
- Sponsoring student fund campaigns
- Organizing and conducting school social and recreational activities
- Teaching intelligent respect for law and order
- Conducting student campaigns and elections
- · Sponsoring assemblies
- · Working with the faculty on school problems and projects
- Sponsoring service projects that are socially relevant to the school and community
- Providing direct channels of communication between the student body and the administration

Writing out the purposes helps to:

- Acquaint the students, faculty, administration and community with the objectives of the Student Council
- · Clarify these goals for everyone
- Inform the members of the Student Council what areas of authority exist within the school
- Formulate beliefs and commitments concerning the Student Council
- Focus the attention of the student body and faculty on the real areas of Council influence
- · Acquaint students with reasons for having a Council
- Aim activities in an appropriate direction
- Help Council with projects and activities
- · Help students select Council members wisely
- · Assist Council in evaluating its work
- Select and plan a suitable course of action using positive methods of involvement in purposeful projects

Attaining Purposes

In attaining the objectives of Student Council, the following suggestions should be kept in mind:

- Students should be given a clear definition and understanding
 of the duties and responsibilities and the available means
 for achieving goals.
- All methods of honest communication should be utilized between Council and its public groups (student body, faculty, community administration, etc.).
- An effective orientation program will make members of the school community aware of each individual's responsibilities.
- Information concerning Council should be given in the orientation of new students, through discussions, in assemblies, club meetings and classrooms.
- The objectives of Council should have the approval and support of the student body, faculty and administration.
- The schools should be aware of goals and be confident that Council will fulfill them.

Ideas & Activities

- Hold your student body elections in late April before exams, graduation and summer recess. It provides an opportunity for an orderly transition and time for attendance at summer leadership training workshops. Sponsor a special service project during the week.
- Honor leaders of student organizations and/or those especially active in co-curricular activities with recognition awards.
- Honor the faculty advisors and administrators who devote their time to working with student leaders.
- Reach out to those students who do not participate in cocurricular school activities. Discover their talents and ask them to help with an upcoming activity.
- Attempt to have someone from your state legislature speak at a community or school function during National Student Leadership Week (NSLW).
- Inform other student organizations about NSLW and coordinate program ideas.
- Meet with your mayor, city, town council or county board of supervisors to ask for official recognition of Student Leadership Week in your community.
